ANNUAL ORGANIZATIONAL MEETING
TUESDAY JANUARY 2, 2001 2:00 PM

The Annual Organizational meeting of the Wyoming County Board of Supervisors was held in the Supervisor's Chamber, Government Center, 143 North Main Street, Warsaw, NY with all members present. Also in attendance was the County Administrator, Kevin DeFebbo and County Assistant Attorney, Gary Malek. Suzanne Aldinger, Clerk of the Board, called the meeting to order and led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Ms. Aldinger requested Supervisor Davis and Supervisor Bush to escort Joseph Kushner, newly elected Supervisor for the Town of Eagle respectfully to his seat. The Oath of Office was administered to all the Supervisors by Judge Mark Dadd.

The sixteen (16) towns of the County of Wyoming will be represented in 2001 as follows: Arcade - A. Douglas Berwanger; Attica - Paul F. Agan; Bennington - Christopher Hickey; Castile - E. Joseph Gozelski. Bowles; Covington - Jerry L. Davis; Eagle - Joseph Kushner; Gainesville - Harold J. Bush; Genesee Falls - Jean M. Totstline; Java - Angela Brunnern; Middlebury - C. Arnold Cox; Orangeville - Suzanne West; Perry - Anne Humphrey; Pike - Larry Rogers; Sheldon - John H. Knab; Warsaw - Howard J. Miller; Wethersfield - Ronald P. Herman, Sr.

Ms. Aldinger called for nominations for Temporary Chairman. Supervisor Miller nominated Supervisor West. Seconded by Supervisor Cox. As there were no other nominations, Ms. Aldinger moved the nominations be closed. A roll call vote was taken with results as follows: Ayes - 1618; Noes - 0; Absent - 0. Supervisor West was declared Temporary Chairman.

Temporary Chairman West called for nominations for Permanent Chairman of the Board. Supervisor Rogers nominated Supervisor A. D. Berwanger; seconded by Supervisor Davis. Supervisor Hickey nominated Supervisor Bush. Seconded by Supervisor Brunner. There were no other nominations. Temporary Chairman West moved that nominations be closed. A ballot vote was conducted. Supervisor Humphrey and Supervisor Brunner were appointed Tellers. Supervisor Rogers and Supervisor Hickey were appointed Inspectors. Supervisor Berwanger was declared Chairman of the Board for the year 2001. The Oath of Office was administered by Judge Mark Dadd.

Chairman Berwanger called for nominations for Vice-Chairman of the Board. Supervisor Herman nominated Supervisor Anne Humphrey; seconded by Supervisor Totstline. There were no other nominations. Chairman Berwanger moved that nominations be closed. A roll call vote was taken with

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results as follows: Ayes - 1618; Noes - 0; Absent - 0; Supervisor Humphrey was declared Vice-Chairman of the Board for the year 2001. The Oath of Office was administered by Judge Mark Dadd.

Chairman Berwanger called for nominations for Clerk of the Board. Supervisor Agan nominated Suzanne Aldinger; seconded by Supervisor Gozelski. No other nominations were made. Chairman Berwanger moved that nominations be closed. A roll call vote was taken with results as follows: Ayes - 1618; Noes - 0; Absent - 0;. Section 3. The maximum estimated cost of reconstruction of 9 miles of Curriers Road in the Towns of Arcade and Java, New York is \$2,922,000.00.

Section 4. The estimated maximum cost of the reconstruction of said road is the sum of \$2,922,000.00 and said amount is hereby appropriated therefor. The plan of financing involves the issuance of \$2,922,000.00 in serial bonds of the County of Wyoming to finance the appropriation, and the levy and collection of taxes upon all the taxable real property in the County in an amount sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds.

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principal amount of \$2,922,000.00 are hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the provisions of the Local Finance Law of the State of New York, to finance the said appropriation.

Section 6. The following additional matters are hereby determined and declared:

a. In accordance with Section 11 of the Local Finance Law, the period of probable usefulness for which said bonds are to be issued is hereinabove set forth for said renovation, such period of probable usefulness being the period of fifteen (15) years. Also, set forth above is the maximum estimated cost for said reconstruction.

WHEREAS, In certain proceedings New York State is required to provide high quality legal assistance to persons otherwise financially unable to obtain counsel and/or necessary expenses of representation; and

WHEREAS, Providing these public defense services the ends of justice in accordance with rights and privileges guaranteed by the constitution of the state of New York and the Constitution of the United States of America; and

WHEREAS, The availability of high quality public defense services affirms the faith of citizens in New York State's government of laws; and

WHEREAS, The present system under County Law Articles 18-A and 18-B of requiring the counties to provide defense services with little state financial assistance and no state oversight is operating unsatisfactorily; and

WHEREAS, The existing limit set by County Law 18-B on fees for counsel assigned to provide public defense services has not been changes since 1986, despite inflation and the increasing costs of maintaining a law practice, remaining at the outdated and unrealistically low rates of \$40 per hour for services rendered in court and \$25 per hour for preparation and other services rendered out of court; and

WHEREAS, These inadequate rates have resulted in a shortage of qualified lawyers to provide defense services, thereby denying or delaying the representation to which public defense clients are entitled, causing court congestion and delay, and eroding public trust and confidence in the legal system; and

WHEREAS, Counties and localities are struggling to carry the increasing burden of fulfilling the state mandate to provide defense services, and cannot bear the cost of raising assigned counsel fees to reasonable levels; and

WHEREAS, In current statutory scheme, each county must provide public defense services and may choose to do so through a legal aid society, a public defender system, an assigned counsel system, or some combination of these systems; and

WHEREAS, I the State supplements the costs of assigned counsel programs by subsidizing the differential between the existing rate and an increased rate, simultaneous support must be allocated to other systems providing quality public defense services to allow counties to continue exercising their right to choose a legal aid or public defender system without fiscal penalty; and

WHEREAS, If the increased cost of assigned counsel becomes another funded mandate passed along to the counties, the rights of clients will suffer due to fiscal constraints placed by already overburdened counties on public defense services; and

WHEREAS, No mechanism currently exists for state oversight of the provision of public defense services, despite its character as a state mandate and the appropriation of some funds to support public defense services; and

WHEREAS, Sound fiscal and governmental policy require oversight of defense services to ensure that the state mandate is being met and to determine the most effective and efficient future allocation of state funds; therefore be it

RESOLVED, That the Wyoming County Board of Supervisors respectfully requests the Governor of the State of New York to introduce legislation this session and the New York State Legislature to pass legislation

- a) Creating an independent and politically insulated statewide Public Defense Commission to oversee both the distribution of state funds and the provision of defense services through an office that would:
 - 1) Establish and monitor compliance with standards for the provision of defense services to assure effective, efficient representation;
 - 2) Evaluate and improve current methods of providing defense services;
 - 3) Administer distribution of state funds to assigned counsel and organized providers;
 - 4) Provide direct representation for eligible persons where required or requested; and
 - 5) Report to the Governor, the Legislature and the Judiciary annually, making recommendations needed to improve the provision of public defense services in New York State.
- b) Raising the rate of compensation set for counsel assigned under Article 18-B, last amended in 1986, to seventy-five dollars per hour.
- c) Creating and indexing procedure to keep assigned counsel rates in line with increases in the cost of living.
- d) Eliminating the in-court/out-of-court differential for such compensation, any felony/misdemeanor and appellate differentials, and per-case caps, because these arbitrary limits do not reflect the professional, ethical, constitutional, and statutory mandates under which counsel must act in all types of cases.
- e) Establishing a schedule of state appropriations to subsidize the increase that will not simultaneously undermine the provision of public defense services by organized providers (public defenders, legal aid societies and not-for-profit providers).

f) Funding the provision of public defense services in each of the counties of the state;

WYOMING COUNTY COMPUTER USE POLICY
ADOPTED

WHEREAS, It is necessary to establish guidelines for the use of County computer equipment and software with the goal of insuring that such equipment and software are used in an appropriate and professional manner; and

WHEREAS, The County of Wyoming desires to implement a computer policy; now therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, That the Wyoming County Board of Supervisors shall adopt the following policy:

1. **Use of Computer Equipment and Software.** Computer equipment and software shall only be used for proper purposes as described herein. All improper uses of such equipment and software are prohibited. Employees who engage in the improper use of computer equipment and software shall be subject to disciplinary action up to and including termination of employment.

- a. **Proper-** Computer equipment and software may be used to enable an employee to carry out his/her job duties and for the furtherance of County business.
- b. **Improper-** Computer equipment and software may not be used for any reason unrelated to County business, including, but not limited to:
 - accessing and/or attempting to access information contained on County computers without proper authorization;
 - performing any action which has the purpose or effect of disrupting County business;
 - performing any action which has the purpose or effect of harassing another person;
 - creating or distributing materials that are discriminatory or offensive;
 - violating any Federal, State, Local law or regulation or violating any County work rule or policy;
 - creating, accessing or distributing pornographic or sexually explicit

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materials;

- engaging in any other behavior which would be considered unprofessional and inappropriate in the workplace by a reasonably prudent person.

In addition, improper use shall include the installation, connection or modification of any computer hardware, software or computer devices on County computer equipment without the express, written authorization from the Director of Information Technology .

2. **Installation of Hardware and Software.** Any employee with a request to have County business related computer hardware or software installed on or connected to County computer equipment must direct this request to his/her Department Head. If the Department Head approves the request, the Department Head must contact Computer Services to request installation or connection. All installations and connections shall be performed by Computer Services unless express, written authorization is given to another person to make an installation or connection.
3. **E-mail.** The purpose of this policy is to ensure the proper use of Wyoming County's e-mail system by its employees. E-mail is a tool for business communications, and users have the responsibility to use this resource in an efficient, effective, ethical and lawful manner. E-mail communications should follow the same standards expected in written business communications and public meetings.

All e-mail accounts maintained on the e-mail systems are the sole property of Wyoming County. Wyoming County has the right to monitor any employee's e-mail account for legitimate business reasons, including compliance with this policy, employee performance and where there is reasonable suspicion of activities that violate this policy.

Employees who are terminated or laid off have no rights to the contents of their e-mail messages and will not be allowed access to the e-mail system. Department Heads or managers may be permitted access to an employee's e-mail in their absence if deemed necessary for the County's business purposes.

The following use of the e-mail system is strictly prohibited:

- _ The creation and exchange of messages that are offensive, harassing, obscene or threatening.
- _ The exchange of proprietary information, trade secrets or any other

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privileged, confidential or sensitive information. Caution should be taken to ensure that messages are addressed to the appropriate recipient; it is easy to inadvertently address e-mail messages incorrectly. Confidential messages should include a warning regarding accidental transmission to an unintended third party.

- The creation and exchange of advertisements, solicitations, chain letters and other unsolicited e-mail. The creation and exchange of information in violation of any copyright laws.
- Registration to list servers without proper authorization. A subscription to such a service can result in an overload of received messages directly impacting the performance of the e-mail system.
- Registration of the County in any news groups or chat rooms.
- Forwarding messages to another person without permission of the originator.
- Reading or sending messages from another user's account except under proper delegate arrangements.
- Altering or copying a message or attachment belonging to another user without the permission of the originator.
- Compromising the privacy of their password by giving it to others or exposing it to public view.

Violations of these prohibitions should be reported to your department head immediately.

The following is acceptable standard e-mail protocol and should be adhered to:

- Retain messages only if relevant to the business or an anticipated litigation. Messages will be retained by the e-mail system for not more than 60 days.
- Address messages to recipients who need to know rather than to everyone you know. Messages sent unnecessarily can impact system and user performance.
- Construct messages professionally (spelling, grammar) and efficiently (subject field, attachments).
- Incidental and infrequent personal use of the County's e-mail system is acceptable.

4. **Record Retention Requirements.** *Employees who create E-mails or other computer documents which involve:*

- policies and directives.
- correspondence or memoranda related to official business.

- work schedules and assignments.
- agendas and minutes of meetings.
- drafts of documents that are circulated for comment or approval.
- any document that initiates, authorizes, or completes a business transaction.
- final reports or recommendations, and
- any other document which is subject to record retention requirements

must retain such documents pursuant to record retention requirements. Such documents should be retained by printing off a hard copy of the document and retaining this document as required. Documents should not be retained on a computer for more than six months unless there is a reasonable expectation that the user will need computer access to such documents in the future.

5. **Monitoring Use.** No employee should have an expectation of privacy in his/her use of computer equipment or software. Employee use of computer equipment and software may be monitored by the County in its discretion.
6. **Further Information.** Any employee who needs further information regarding the proper and improper uses of computer equipment and software should contact the Director of Information Technology.
7. **Modifications to Policy.** The County reserves the right to modify this policy at any time.

DEFINITIONS:

Computer equipment and software as used herein means County owned computer equipment (including, but not limited to, personal computers, laptops, hand held devices and any peripheral devices), software provided by the County, E-mail systems provided by the County, Internet services provided by the County, and any other equipment or software related to County computer use which are made available to employees by the County. Software also includes any County business related software: licensed to the County from third parties, obtained from other agencies (State, Federal, etc.), and downloaded from the Internet.

County business as used herein means the areas of service which the County provides to the public pursuant to the directives of the Federal Government, State Government, Wyoming County Board of Supervisors, and/or

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the County Administrator.

Hard copy as used herein means a tangible, written document. When a computer document has been printed, the result is the hard copy.

Job duties as used herein means the responsibilities of an employee relating to his/her work for Wyoming County.

Therefore be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Director of Information Technology shall be responsible for the implementation and adherence to this Computer Use Policy and by all County Departments affected; and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That this policy may be amended and/or revised, with the approval of the appropriate Committee of this Board as required, and be it

WHEREAS, The report, State-County Relations in New York: Key partnership Issues - The Impacts of State Revenue Sharing and the Medicaid Mandate, commissioned by the New York State Senate, documents inefficiencies of the current Medicaid administrative system and recommends a series of changes in administrative procedure and communications that would strengthen the state-local partnership; and

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WHEREAS, The recommendations include provisions to replace the existing administrative system and address the concerns of county governments, including the following:

- That counties be given sufficient notice of changes that will impact their local share or administrative costs;
- That revisions affecting county medical assistance budgets not to be imposed on a county during a county fiscal year;
- That funding predictability be improved to enhance counties' planning capability;
- That timely adjustments be made to county share amounts and counties be provided with information in advance;
- That the state improve the exchange of data and information with the counties, particularly in the area of overburden aid;
- That counties be given flexibility to be more effective managers, specifically in the area of competitive bidding; and
- That the medical assistance advisory group be established within the department of health which could serve as a liaison to counties on matters of payments, practices, and policies; and

**INTRODUCTORY LOCAL LAW NO. C, YEAR 2001
COUNTY OF WYOMING**

**“A LOCAL LAW ESTABLISHING AND RELATING TO WIRELESS 911
CALL ROUTING BY THE COUNTY OF WYOMING.”**

Section 1. **Name.** This local law shall be know as the Wyoming County Wireless 911 Call Routing Law.

Section 2. **Authority.** This local law is enacted under authority of

Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors

Section 10 of the Municipal Home Rule Law of the State of New York, Article IX of the State Constitution of New York, the County Law, and other applicable statutory and decisional law.

Section 3. **Findings and Declaration of Intent.** The Wyoming County Board of Supervisors (hereinafter "Board of Supervisors") recognizes the paramount importance of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the County and further recognizes that when the lives or property of its citizens are in imminent danger that appropriate assistance must be rendered as expeditiously as possible.

The Board of Supervisors recognizes further that such assistance is increasingly summoned by wireless communications including but not limited to cellular phones and that unintentional, though avoidable, delays in reaching appropriate emergency aid can and does occur to the detriment and jeopardy of life and property when such wireless 911 calls from within Wyoming County are routed to anywhere other than directly to the single countrywide Wyoming County Public Service Answering Point (PSAP) which is under the jurisdiction of the Wyoming County Sheriffs Office.

The Board of Supervisors further finds that a major obstacle to the prompt response to emergent wireless requests for assistance in Wyoming County is the failure of one or more wireless telephone service suppliers to directly route such calls to the Wyoming County Public Service Answering Point (PSAP).

The Board of Supervisors further finds that the Wyoming County Public Service Answering Point (PSAP) has the most accurate, current and extensive knowledge of Wyoming County's geography, roadways, landmarks, emergency sendee resources and similar information of critical importance in emergent situations and can immediately dispatch the number and type of emergency services the situation requires.

The Board of Supervisors further finds and declares that, by the enactment of the provisions of this local law, it is the intent of the Board of Supervisors to fulfill its obligation to provide for the health, safety and welfare of the people of this County by mandating the direct routing of 911 calls, including wireless calls, by service suppliers directly to the Wyoming County Public Service Answering Point (PSAP) so as to facilitate the rendering of emergency services as expeditiously and effectively as possible.

Section 4. **Definitions.** For the purpose of this law:

a) "Wireless telephone service" means all commercial mobile services, as that term is defined in section 332(d) of title 47, United States Code, including all broadband personal communications services, wireless radio telephone services, geographic area specialized and enhanced specialized mobile radio services, and incumbent wide area specialized mobile radio licensees, which offer real time, two-way voice service that is interconnected with the public switched telephone network.

b) "Wireless telephone service supplier" means any corporation or person as defined in section ten hundred eighty of the Tax Law which provides wireless telephone service in New York State.

c) "Wyoming County Public Service Answering Point" or "Wyoming County PSAP" means the site designated and operated by the County of Wyoming through its 911 Coordinator for the purpose of receiving emergency calls including those from a wireless telephone service and dispatching needed emergency services.

Section 5. **Routing.** All wireless telephone service suppliers doing business in Wyoming County shall route all 911 emergency calls to the Wyoming County Public Service Answering Point (PSAP).

Section 6. **Prohibited Areas.**

a) No wireless telephone service supplier shall knowingly fail to route wireless 911 telephone calls originating within Wyoming County to the Wyoming County PSAP as required by Section 5 above.

b) No owner, official, employee or agent of a wireless telephone supplier shall design, implement, arrange or cause, either directly or indirectly, a process or activity whereby 911 calls are routed other than as provided in Section 5 above.

c) No person or entity shall, either directly or indirectly, solicit, suggest, implore, agree or otherwise take action so as to cause or seek to cause a wireless telephone service supplier to route wireless 911 calls from within Wyoming County to other than the Wyoming County Public Service Answering Point (PSAP).

Section 7. **Sanctions.** Any person or entity violating this local law shall be guilty of a unclassified misdemeanor and shall be subject to a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars and/or to a period of confinement in the Wyoming County Jail for a period not to exceed three months for each offense.

Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors

For purposes of this law, each improperly routed 911 call shall constitute a separate offense.

Sections 8. **Additional Remedies.**

a) In addition to the Sanctions provided in Section 7 above, any wireless telephone service supplier failing to observe the requirements of Section 5 above, shall be liable for personal injury including death and/or property damage caused or exacerbated by reason of said failure.

b) The Chairman of the Board of Supervisors is authorized to pursue any appropriate legal remedy including but not limited to injunction to effectuate the purposes of this local law.

Section 9. **Separability and Saving Provisions.** This local law is separate and apart from any other local law, and each provision hereof is separate from any other provision. If this local law or portion thereof is found to be invalid, no other law or unaffected portion of this law shall be affected thereby and shall remain in full force and effect.

Section 10. **Effective Date.** This local law shall be effective thirty days after it is enacted by the Board of Supervisors.

**INTRODUCTION OF PROPOSED LOCAL LAW NO. D- YEAR 2001,

BE IT ENACTED by the Board of Supervisors of the County of Wyoming as follows:

Section 2 shall be amended as follows:

Section 2: Resolution of Villages:

a. Any village lying within the County of Wyoming may elect each year to have its delinquent Village taxes collected by the County of Wyoming in accordance with Section 1442 of the Real Property Tax Law of the State of New York. In any year in which a village shall make such determination, it shall cause a certified copy of the resolution of the Village Board authorizing such action to be provided to the Wyoming County Treasurer and the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors. Such resolution shall be adopted by the Village Board no earlier than September 1st of each year and shall be applicable to taxes levied in June of that year. The certified copies shall be delivered as set forth above, no later than October 1st of each year.

b. In addition to the foregoing, any village lying within the County of Wyoming may elect to have delinquent village taxes for the years 1994 and prior collected by the County of Wyoming in accordance with Section 1442 of the Real Property Tax Law of the State of New York. Such resolution shall be adopted by the Village Board no earlier than Sept 1, 2001. This provision regarding the payment of delinquent village taxes for the years 1994 and prior shall be operable for village resolutions received by the County in 2001 only.

Section 7. Effective Date. This local law shall become effective upon the filing thereof in the office of the Secretary of State of the State of New York.

Chairman Berwanger, T/Arcade introduced Kevin D. DeFebbo to present the State of the County Address. The County State of Address was presented as follows:

On behalf of Chairman A. D. Berwanger and the Board of Supervisors, I would like to thank the Fair Board for the opportunity to share the "*State of the County Address*" with you today.

The group of men and women assembled here before you represent the **80th SESSION** of the Board of Supervisors.

These individuals proudly present for your consideration the County's accomplishments over the past year and the challenges that lie ahead.

PROPERTY TAX

Research has shown over and over again that taxes can critically affect an area's economic vitality and quality of life.

Given this fact, and the tax burden already placed on County residents by the State of New York, the Board has made the maintenance of *a fair and less onerous taxation policy* one of the Board's top priorities.

The County's 2001 Average Tax Rate (ART) was again held steady at \$5.80 per 1000.

This is the 7th consecutive year that the average tax rate has decreased or been held at the same rate.

Such a practice is **good news for taxpayers** and one that can reap actual savings for some individuals depending on a variety of related tax considerations.

A hypothetical example might be helpful.

If the "average" county home were assessed at \$80,000, and if that assessment value were held the same at \$80,000 from 1994-2001, and if no exemptions and equalization formulae were applied, the COUNTY tax receipts from this one tax parcel would have **dropped** from *\$715.20 in 1994* to **\$464.00 in 2001**.

Such a taxing philosophy has helped the County maintain a very competitive taxation position, earning us the title as **the New York County** with the **lowest reliance** on the **property tax**.

ECONOMIC PROGRESS

Keeping taxes low, however, is not enough to ensure the continued vitality of Wyoming County.

Our residents must have jobs.

During this past year, the Board of Supervisors has partnered with various local governments, business leaders, and our elected State and Federal Representatives to effectuate a number of initiatives to help create jobs.

- Micro-enterprise Loan Program
- Almor Building Demolition and Fairview Expansion
 - Job Expansion at Taylor Pohlman
- Beaver Hollow Conference Center Expansion
- Pioneer Credit Recovery Expansion to Perry Satellite

These initiatives have the potential of producing approximately 250 new jobs over the next few years.

POWERED BY THE WIND

The reviews are coming in

“Stunning”

“Poetry of wind”

“Magical”

Although they are a sight of beauty and grace, the ten (10) windmills (actually wind turbines) that sit atop the highest point in Wyoming County, could fuel a whole new undiscovered area of economic activity for our County.

Owned and operated by Western New York Wind Partners, these 213 feet high wind powered electric generators have catapulted Wyoming County into the national energy spotlight.

Given the fact that Wyoming County is home to one of the best “sustainable” wind areas east of the Mississippi, we may have just started to scratch the surface of our potential.

In the coming months, we will be examining how best to position itself to fully capitalize on this resource.

The Board would like to thank the Town of Wethersfield and Supervisor Ron Herman for their efforts on this important project.

STRATEGIC PLAN

Helping Wyoming County realize its potential as a “world class rural community” was the vision and motivation behind the development of the County’s first strategic plan.

Entitled *Target Tomorrow*, this written plan was the culmination of almost two (2) years of work by the Board of Supervisors, development staff, and hundreds of citizen participants from all segments of our community.

Funded in part by a \$60,000 grant from the Economic Development

Proceedings of the Board of Supervisors

Administration (EDA), the strategic planning process produced a number of short and long-term action steps to help us improve our competitive economic position throughout New York State and the nation.

Work is now underway to implement many of these recommendations.

GOVERNMENT CENTER

The Board of Supervisors completed the final part of the Courthouse Campus Master Plan with the rehabilitation of the “old” Courthouse building.

Renamed the *WYOMING COUNTY GOVERNMENT CENTER*, this \$3.5 million project was completed **on time** and at a cost of **\$770,432.40** less than the certified construction estimate of \$4,247,293.00.

The new home of the Board of Supervisors, the County Clerk, the Treasurer, and a number of other departments, stands as a proud symbol of our County Seat.

DMV RELOCATION

Rehabilitation of the old courthouse has also led to the improvement of services in other areas.

The Department of Motor Vehicles was relocated from the basement of the Government Center to privately leased space on Perry Avenue within the Village of Warsaw.

Occupying the former Big M space contiguous to the Warsaw Municipal Lot, this new state of the art facility has greatly improved the convenience and speed of service for those seeking DMV services.

BUSINESS CENTER

On April 14, 2001 the Board of Supervisors dedicated the new

WYOMING COUNTY BUSINESS CENTER

Strategically located half-way between the Villages of Perry and Warsaw, this new facility has become the home of the County’s Planning and Development Department, its IDA program, the Business Education Council, and the Wyoming County Chamber of Commerce.

This partnership of four (4) important business related agencies under one roof fulfills the County’s long- standing vision of providing a competitive

one-stop approach to economic development.

GOVERNOR PATAKI VISITS

For the first time since 1979, Wyoming County had the honor to host the standing Governor of our great State.

Governor George Pataki's visit this summer provided Wyoming County with the opportunity to showcase for the Governor and a statewide audience what we already know:

Wyoming County represents the best of rural living in New York State.

B. The Board of Supervisors would like to publicly thank Congressman Thomas Reynolds, and our own Agricultural Commissioner, Nathan Rudgers, for making this historic visit possible.

TOBACCO SECURITIZATION

The Master Settlement Agreement (MSA) with the tobacco industry produced an unexpected and *unsecured* windfall for Wyoming County.

To minimize this risk, the Board of Supervisors participated in the New York State Association of Counties' (NYSAC) securitization pool and received a one-time, lump sum payment of **\$7,628,668.00** to settle its account with Big Tobacco.

These proceeds were applied to the reduction of most of the County's existing debt obligations on the jail and new courthouse.

The resulting application of tobacco funds to debt service has eliminated the County's need to apply levy funds to such debt.

Pursuant to law, a special Wyoming County Securitization Board appointed by the Board of Supervisors has been established to oversee and manage these funds.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PLAN (CIP)

Wyoming County, like its sister counties across the State of New York, has been faced with the same age-old problem.

How to **Pay for** costly capital improvements, **Meet all** State mandates, **Provide** needed services and **keep** taxes low.

There have been few, if any, easy answers.

Normally, not wanting to tax the County into greater disadvantage, and needing to provide basic services and meet state mandates, the County has been forced to let many capital needs go unmet.

Some of this is changing, however. Thanks in large measure to the Tobacco Securitization Settlement, and the cumulative effect of the Board’s fiscal policies, the Board of Supervisors recently created its first Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) and budget.

Although details are still being completed, CIP funds will be used to finance these projects during 2001.

New Dog Control Facility	\$120,000

Correction of HVAC at South Warsaw Building	\$22,500
911 Center: Battery Back-up System Installation	\$43,500

It is expected that new projects will be prioritized and planned each year.

In the coming months and years, the Board of Supervisors will be

focusing on the following issues.

- Commencing the implementation of the Strategic Plan.
- Partnering with Cooperative Extension to develop a county agricultural development strategy
- Examining the maximization of our wind and methane energy potential
- Re-evaluation and continuation of Better Pavements Program
- Implementation of GASB 34 regulations
- Continuing improvements in our budgeting and revenue collection efforts as we deal with the slow down of our sales tax revenue.
- Dealing with the fiscal demands resulting from Medicaid growth
- Partnering with the Hospital Board of Managers in its master planning
- Continuation of the Capital Improvement Plan

CLOSING OFFERINGS

I stand before you today to reaffirm that the State of the County is strong and vibrant.

Our tax burden remains low, our economic vitality is improving, our service obligations are being met, and important actions steps are being taken to position the County for its bright future.

As a democratic institution, the Board of Supervisors believes in open and honest government and accepts the responsibility of leadership that the people have given us.

The Special Session of the Wyoming County Board of Supervisors was held at the Wyoming County Government Center, in the Supervisor's Chambers, 143 North Main Street, Warsaw, NY with all members present except for Supervisor Gozelski, Town of Castile, Supervisor Bush, Town of Gainesville, Supervisors Totslie, Town of Genesee Falls, Supervisor Brunner, Town of Java, Supervisors Knab, Town of Sheldon and Supervisor Miller, Town of Warsaw. County Attorney Eric T. Dadd and County Administrator Kevin D. Defebbo were absent. Chairman Berwanger called the meeting to order and led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

Chairman Berwanger thanked everyone for attending on such short notice due to the unforeseen events that occurred on September 11, 2001, "Attach on America". SECTION 1. The first sentence of section two of Resolution No. 80-284, as enacted November 25, 1980, as amended, is amended to read as follows:

SECTION 2. Imposition of sales tax.

On and after March 1, 1981, there is hereby imposed and there shall be paid a tax of three percent upon, and for the period commencing December 1, 1992 and ending November 30, 2003, there is hereby imposed and there shall be paid an additional tax of one percent upon:

SECTION 2. Subdivision (f) of section three of Resolution No. 80-284 as enacted in nineteen hundred eighty, as amended, is amended to read as follows:

(f) With respect to the additional tax of one percent imposed for the period commencing December 1, 1992 and ending November 30, 2003, the provisions of subdivisions (a), (b), (c), (d) and (e) of this section apply, except that for the purposes of this subdivision, all references in said subdivisions (a), (b), (c) and (d) to an effective date shall be read as referring to December 1, 1992, all references in said subdivision (a) to the date four months prior to the effective date shall be read as referring to August 1, 1992, and the reference in subdivision (b) to the date immediately preceding the effective date shall be read as referring to November 30, 1992. Nothing herein shall be deemed to exempt from tax at the rate in effect prior to December 1, 1992 any transaction which may not be subject to the additional tax imposed effective on that date.

SECTION 3. Section four of Resolution No. 80-284 as enacted in nineteen hundred eighty, as amended, is amended to read as follows:

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SECTION 4. Imposition of compensating use tax.

(a) Except to the extent that property or services have already been or will be subject to the sales tax under this enactment, there is hereby imposed on every person a use tax for the use within this taxing jurisdiction on and after December 1, 1992, except as otherwise exempted under this enactment, (A) of any tangible personal property purchased at retail, (B) of any tangible personal property (other than computer software used by the author or other creator) manufactured, processed or assembled by the user, (I) if items of the same kind of tangible personal property are offered for sale by him in the regular course of business or (ii) if items are used as such or incorporated into a structure, building or real property, by a contractor, subcontractor or repairman in erecting structures or buildings, or building on, or otherwise adding to, altering, improving, maintaining, servicing or repairing real property, property or land, as the terms real property, property or land are defined in the real property tax law, if items of the same kind are not offered for sale as such by such contractor, subcontractor or repairman or other user in the regular course of business, (c) of any of the services described in paragraphs (1), (7) and (8) of subdivision (c) of section two, (D) of any tangible personal property, however acquired, where not acquired for purposes of resale, upon which any of the services described under paragraphs (2), (3) and (7) of subdivision (c) of section two have been performed, (E) of any telephone answering service described in subdivision (b) of section two and (F) of any computer software written or otherwise created by the user if the user offers software of a similar kind for sale as such or as a component part of other property in the regular course of business.

(b) For purposes of clause (A) of subdivision (a) of this section, for the period commencing December 1, 1992 and ending November 30, 2003, the tax shall be at the rate of four percent, and on and after December 1, 2003, the tax shall be at the rate of three percent, of the consideration given or contracted to be given for such property, or for the use of such property, including any charges for shipping or delivery as described in paragraph three of subdivision (b) of section one, but excluding any credit for tangible personal property accepted in part payment and intended for resale.

(c) For purposes of subclause (I) of clause (B) of subdivision (a) of this section, for the period commencing December 1, 1992 and ending November 30, 2003, the tax shall be at the rate of four percent, and on and after December 1, 2003, the tax shall be at the rate of three percent, of the price at which items of the same kind of tangible personal property are offered for sale by the user, and the mere storage, keeping, retention or withdrawal from storage of tangible personal property by the person who manufactured, processed or assembled such

property shall not be deemed a taxable use by him.

(d) For purposes of subclause (ii) of clause (B) of subdivision (a) of this section, for the period commencing December 1, 1992 and ending November 30, 2003, the tax shall be at the rate of four percent, and on and after December 1, 2003, the tax shall be at the rate of three percent, of the consideration given or contracted to be given for the tangible personal property manufactured, processed or assembled into the tangible personal property the use of which is subject to tax, including any charges for shipping or delivery as described in paragraph three of subdivision (b) of section one.

(e) Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this section, for purposes of clause (B) of subdivision (a) of this section, there shall be no tax on any portion of such price which represents the value added by the user to tangible personal property which he fabricates and installs to the specifications of an addition or capital improvement to real property, property or land, as the terms real property, property or land are defined in the real property tax law, over and above the prevailing normal purchase price prior to such fabrication of such tangible personal property which a manufacturer, producer or assembler would charge an unrelated contractor who similarly fabricated and installed such tangible personal property to the specifications of an addition or capital improvement to such real property, property or land.

(f) For purposes of clauses (C), (D) and (E) of subdivision (a) of this section, for the period commencing December 1, 1992 and ending November 30, 2003, the tax shall be at the rate of four percent, and on and after December 1, 2003, the tax shall be at the rate of three percent, of the consideration given or contracted to be given for the service, including the consideration of any tangible personal property transferred in conjunction with the performance of the service and also including any charges for shipping and delivery of the property so transferred and of the tangible personal property upon which the service was performed as such charges are described in paragraph three of subdivision (b) of section one.

(g) For purposes of clause (F) of subdivision (a) of this section, for the period commencing December 1, 1992 and ending November 30, 2003, the tax shall be at the rate of four percent, and on and after December 1, 2003, the tax shall be at the rate of three percent, of the consideration given or contracted to be given for the tangible personal property which constitutes the blank medium, such as disks or tapes, used in conjunction with the software, or for the use of such property, and the mere storage, keeping, retention or withdrawal from storage of computer software described in such clause (F) by its author

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or other creator shall not be deemed a taxable use by such person.

SECTION 4. Subdivision (k) of section six of Resolution No. 80-284 as enacted in nineteen hundred eighty, as amended, is amended to read as follows:

(k) Exemption of certain energy sources and related services from additional one percent rate of tax. Notwithstanding any inconsistent provision of this resolution, receipts from the retail sale or use of fuel oil and coal used for residential purposes; the receipts from the retail sale or use of wood used for residential heating purposes; and the receipts from every sale, other than for resale, or use of propane (except when sold in containers of less than one hundred pounds), natural gas, electricity, steam and gas, electric and steam services used for residential purposes shall be exempt from the additional one percent rate of sales and compensating use taxes imposed, by sections 2 and 4, respectively, of this resolution for the period commencing December 1, 1992 and ending November 30, 2003.

On behalf of Chairman A. D. Berwanger, Finance Chairman Anne Humphrey and the Board of Supervisors, I am honored to present the *2002 Administrative Budget Recommendation*.

Paula Parker for the many hours they contributed to this recommendation. Special acknowledgement also goes out to Madonna Barber and Cheryl Mayer for their help in creating and distributing the reports before you.

FOCUS AND GOALS

The 2002 budget was developed to provide a baseline budget document for the Board Committees to utilize in their budget deliberations.

To this end, the budget team's recommendation focused on the development of a baseline budget that was

- Complete and comprehensive.
- Accurate and realistic in the whole, as well as from a departmental or agency perspective.
- A true reflection of the County's actual cost to provide basic services.

It was also our intent to provide the Board of Supervisors with a future budget plan that took into account all aspects of our finances including existing union contracts, debt repayment obligations, health and workers compensation issues, and revenue projections and enhancements.

A PLAN TO GUIDE THE UNKNOWN

It is critical for us to acknowledge and understand that this recommendation is being presented at a time in which the very ramparts of our finances could be under siege from forces outside our control.

The September 11th terrorist attack on the World Trade Towers has and will continue to affect New York State's economy and political priorities.

D. As a subdivision of the State, Wyoming County will not be immune from these significant changes.

Although it is too early at this time to assess the true impact on the County, **it appears likely** that our *sales tax revenues will not increase as they have*, and our *State reimbursement claims or payments could be delayed*.

The duration and severity of this impact is the unknown.

The challenge before us will be to assess this impact accurately, and to make those adjustments necessary to provide basic services and maintain fiscal solvency.

This budget recommendation, however, attempts to navigate through

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these uncertainties by providing a plan that is both balanced and flexible, allowing for maximum maneuverability.

DIRECTIONS AND DOCUMENTS

By way of following the budget recommendation, today's presentation will be supported by these documents.

- 1) **BRC (ACS) Summary.** This is a report of the general fund budget by department, organized though the major spending categories of

Point 1 - Personnel

Point 2 - Capital

Point 4 - Contractual and Commodities

Point 8 - Benefits

- 2) **Budget Worksheet Summary (Appendix 1).** This is a condensed report of the general fund organized by department that compared "requested" versus "recommended".
- 3) **Fund Summary (Appendix 2).** This is a report of the overall county budget organized by funds.
- 4) **Budget Balancing Strategies (Appendix 3).** This is a summary report of those actions recommended by the budget team to balance the budget taking into consideration new serial debt for the Courthouse and Curriers Road. A two (2) year perspective has been offered to account for the larger 2nd year serial bond payment.
- 5) **Average Tax Rate (Appendix 4).** This is a report that identifies the impact of the budget team's recommendation on the average tax rate.
- 6) **Budget Recap (Appendix 5).** This is a report that identifies the source of the department/agency requests as compared to the Budget Team.

SUM AND SUBSTANCE: The Big Picture

The 2002 Administrative budget provides for a spending plan of \$38,280,629, a 2% or \$832,681 increase over the approved 2001 plan. The hospital budget was not included.

As always, our primary concern was the effect such a spending plan would have on the levy. To this end, the budget team received total departmental and agency *levy* requests of **\$10,803,540**, exclusive of all debt obligations.

After correcting for errors and deletions, this represented a **\$1,707,040** or **4.66%** increase over the 2001 Levy.

Although this levy increase can be attributed to almost all departments, the Sheriff, the Jail, the Highway and the Treasurer (revenue adjustment) accounted for 70% of the total.

In addition to these agency and departmental requests, the 2002 budget required the County to make a required *Bond Anticipation Note (BAN)* payment of approximately \$1,275,000. This payment was needed to cover the 2002 payment on the Curriers Road and Courthouse projects.

After numerous meetings, the Board of Supervisors agreed that the BANs should be combined and serialized into one (1) 10 year serial bond.

Subsequently, the budget team's handling of the debt issue focused on incorporating the serial bond into any recommendations on the budget.

The projected 1st year serial payment was calculated at \$390,447.

Taken as a whole, departmental requests AND the serialized bond payment produced a levy deficit of **\$2,097,487 over the 2001 approved levy**.

In order to reduce this deficit and to develop a balanced, cost effective spending plan, the budget team **has proposed** these cuts and adjustments.

1) BUDGET CUTS. It is important to note that, as directed by the Finance Committee, the budget team focused on the development of a "realistic, workable budget" for each department. Depending on the need and accuracy of each departmental request, revenues or expenditures were either added or cut.

Furthermore, in order to sustain our ability to respond to unknown problems beyond our control, the budget team has recommended that the salaries of all management and management support officials contained in Salary Schedules I, D, and S should be **frozen at 2001 levels**. Such a freeze could result in a saving of approximately \$100,000.

This spending plan still provides for performance step allowances and the previously approved three (3) year incremental upgrades.

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Taken as a whole, we trimmed **\$348,483** from these departmental and agency requests.

We have also proposed that the following adjustments be adopted to erase the remainder of the deficit.

- 2) **SALES TAX ADJUSTMENT.** We recommended that the amount of sales tax revenue to be included in the budget plan should be increased from \$10,700,000 this year to \$11,100,00 in 2002. This increase was projected to maintain a \$600,000 to \$700,000 cushion between actual versus budget receipts.
3. **REDUCE CONTIGENCY.** The budget team recommended that the contingency line be reduced from \$582,000 in 2001 to \$300,000 for next year. Much of this decision was made possible by the addition of \$400,000 in the highway's regular snow account, rather than rely on a contingency line as we have this year.
4. **BAN PROCEEDS APPLIED.** As a result of the return realized by the Treasurer on our existing BANS, approximately \$60,000 was available and has been applied to amortize part of the refinancing costs associated with serialization.
5. **APPLY CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT (CIP) FUNDS.** Given the connection of the CIP to the repayment of the Curriers Road, the committee recommends and has included the transfer of \$84,000 from the 2002 project CIP budget.
- 6) **TRANSFER OF GENERAL FUNDS TO CIP DEFERRED.** All things being equal, it was originally projected that the County would transfer approximately **\$200,000** per year to the CIP from the general fund. Sadly, these are not "equal" times. Given the debt demands of the two BANS, the team has recommended that that transfer be deferred to such a point that our financial condition has improved. Even without the addition of the \$200,000 transfer to the CIP this year, the CIP fund is projected to have a modest balance needed to finance capital projects. The Board will need to meet later this year to finalize the CIP budget plan.
- 7) **TRANSFER FROM RISK RETENTION.** Our workers compensation program has done an excellent job of reducing the cost of workers compensation to all members. In order to maintain this fine record, the Workers Compensation Executive Committee has recommended that the plan NOT apply a dividend/rebate to pool members for 2002. This has resulted in higher premiums to all pool members. The Budget Team has recommended that the Board transfer approximately

\$75,000 from the risk retention fund to cover this increase and part of the cost of providing workers compensation insurance for fireman.

Future use of this fund for this purpose will have to be examined in future years.

8) **FUND BALANCE INCREASE.** The Team has also recommended that the fund balance utilized to supplement the budget be increased from **\$1,300,000 in 2001** to **\$1,600,000 in 2002**. This revised figure, however, is still approximately \$200,000 less than the fund balance adopted in the FY 2000 budget.

9) **LEVY INCREASE.** A modest levy increase of **3.52%** has been recommended to raise approximately **\$277,254** in much needed additional revenue.

The average county tax rate would go from \$5.80 per thousand to \$5.92 per thousand. For a home assessed at \$100,000, the average tax increase would be \$12.00 per year.

With the exception of fiscal years 2000 and 2001, it should be noted that the projected county average is still at its lowest, modern level.

If these adjustments and cuts are accepted as proposed by the budget team, the overall budget would be brought into **balance** and reflect these changes from the approved 2001 budget.

THE MICRO VIEW

In order to fully understand what this recommendation **does or does not** provide for, it is important to examine the budget from a closer perspective.

This budget plan

- Does **not** support the **creation** of any new positions not already created in prior years.

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- Provides for no layoffs or reductions in force at this time.
 - Cuts all capital expenditures, with the exception of Sheriff vehicles (**5 left in**), and a modest amount for computer and DSS equipment.
 - Trims all contractual and commodity items to reflect projected actual costs.
 - Reflects the Board's desire to serialize its existing BAN debt, hereby reducing our projected debt payment next year.
 - Provides for the continued support of all existing **contract agencies** at 2001 levels.
 - Adjusts all .8 benefit allowances to the correct calculations.
 - Provides for a projected 15% across the board allowance for health insurance premium increases.
 - Reflects no levy contribution to the Wyoming County Health System for the 11th straight year.
 - Provides for sufficient resources to continue those services now provided by the County.
 - Provides, however, for no new programs or initiatives.
 - Provides for the continuation of our Pathways and Transitions initiatives at the 2001 level.
 - Provides for an increased level of funding for the assigned counsel program.
 - Provides for sufficient funding to honor those labor contracts already approved before FY 2002.
 - Maintains the County's contribution to the Perry/Warsaw Airport.

AREAS TO WATCH

No budget can completely provide for all the financial exigencies that can occur during any one year.

The best that one can hope for is that the adopted budget plan is as accurate and flexible as possible given the known facts.

The budget team's budget recommendation was developed with those two goals in mind.

It was our hope that accurate information contained herein will provide the Board with the flexibility it needs to address the many issues facing the County in 2002.

Aside from the potential impact that the WTC terrorist event could have, the County faces many challenges more of our own making.

These include

- The increasing cost of Medicaid and the effect such will have on the County levy.
- The loss of jail revenue as a result of the continued growth of our resident jail population, and the concomitant affect this will have on our need to board prisoners outside the County or to expand the jail.
- The apparent stagnation of our sales tax and the affect such a problem will have on our fund balance.

We will need to address these problems in order to secure our immediate financial future.

CLOSINGS

On behalf of the Budget Team, I would like to thank the Board for the opportunity to provide this recommendation.

We stand ready to assist the committees as they hold budget hearings and work to finalize their general, highway, hospital and CIP budgets.

The Budget Session of the Wyoming County Board of Supervisors was held in the Supervisor's Chambers, Government Center, 143 North Main Street, Warsaw, New York with all members present. Also present was County Administrator, Kevin D. DeFebbo. Chairman Berwanger, T/Arcade called the meeting to order and led the Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag.

There were no communications.

Chairman Berwanger, T/Arcade, declared the Public Hearing opened in regards to the 2002 Wyoming County Budget. Chairman Berwanger introduced Wyoming County Budget Officer/County Administrator Kevin D. DeFebbo. Mr. DeFebbo presented the 2002 Wyoming County Budget as follows:

2002 BUDGET MESSAGE

County of Wyoming

On behalf of Chairman A. D. Berwanger and the Wyoming County Board of Supervisors, I am honored to present the TENTATIVE 2002 BUDGET.

The spending plan before you today represents thousands of hours of work by our department heads, management staff, and the committees of the Board of Supervisors.

It is important for us to acknowledge that this recommendation is being presented for public review during a time when County finances are under siege from forces outside the control of this Board.

The September 11th terrorist event will continue to affect New York State's economic stability.

As a subdivision and service partner of the State government, Wyoming County will not be immune from these events.

It appears likely that our sales tax revenues will not increase as they have in the past and our State reimbursement claims or payments could be delayed. There is also a strong likelihood that the State may also rescind past funding commitments to the counties on some programs altogether.

December 06, 2001

Although we are starting to see the first signs of this event, it is too early to assess the true impact on the County's ability to provide services and to pay for such services.

The Board of Supervisors' tentative 2002 budget, however, was developed to guide the County through these difficult and uncertain times, providing a blueprint that is both reasonable and flexible given the unknown.

This year, more than ever, the approved budget must be viewed by our department heads, employees, and contract agencies as an "**interim**" budgeting document that will be carefully watched, managed, and amended by the Board as new facts and conditions are made known during the coming year.

The proposed budget contains total appropriations of **\$83,833,597**.

This represents a decrease of approximately **\$1,666,301** from the 2001 budget.

It should be noted that this figure reflects our suspension of Marchiselli financed bridge building projects planned for 2002.

It is equally important to note that this appropriation was realized despite more than a **\$1,000,000** increase in *health insurance, retirement, and workers compensation costs*.

Significant declines in investment returns have forced new retirement costs onto the County.

In FY 2002, it is expected that the County's retirement cost alone will increase by **\$600,000** or **700%**, as our retirement contribution goes from .05% in 2001 to 4% in 2002.

This total appropriation also contains an expenditure of **\$440,872** to cover the serial bond debt cost on the Government Center and the Curriers Road Projects.

Finally, it should be noted that the budget reflects a **\$200,000** increase for State mandated Medicaid costs.

The news from our revenue side is equally challenging.

Our baseline **estimated** revenues **not derived** from special funds, bond proceeds, applied levy or fund balances has also **decreased** **\$1,547,343**, totaling **\$73,377,314** for the coming year.

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Much of this decline can be traced to the general decrease in state reimbursements, abolishment of the **CHIPS** program, and the unavailability of one-time bond proceeds from the Government Center project. The suspension of Marchiselli bridge reimbursement is also reflected in this decrease.

The battle to balance *decreased revenues and increased costs* was difficult requiring some very tough choices as well as some creative solutions.

Utilizing the structure of the budget process as it flowed from the department heads, to the budget team, to the standing committee, the Finance Committee has proposed the following changes to bring the budget into right order.

F. **SPENDING CUTS.** In addition to the cuts made by the budget team and the standing committees, the Finance Committee has also proposed approximately \$400,000 more in cuts during the budget reconciliation process. These include

G.

- H. An additional 2% across the board cut to all County Departments
- I. Suspension of management's salary step system
- J. Freezing the salaries of all elected and appointed management officials including the Board of Supervisors
- K. Cutting the County's contribution to the Perry-Warsaw Airport
- L. Reducing the County's contribution to Mercy Flight
- . Eliminating the temporary clerical pool
- . Reducing the number of new sheriff vehicles.

BAN(Bond Anticipation Note) REFINANCING. The County's two (2) existing BANS on the Government Center and the Curriers Road are proposed to be refinanced into a (15) fifteen year serial bond. \$60,000 realized from the BAN proceeds will also be brought into the budget to help offset this debt.

SALES TAX. Due to new trending information received recently, the sales tax figure was revised downward from \$11.1M to \$10.8M.

FUND BALANCE. The fund balance will be adjusted downward to \$1.45M from the original budget team's recommendation of \$1.6M.

M. **OTHER FUNDS.** Other special funds will also be brought into the budget to help cover specific cost increases experienced this

year.
N.

- Risk Retention.** \$75,000 will be allocated to cover Firemen Compensation.
- CIP.** \$84,000 will be allocated to cover serial bond debt on Curriers Road.
- Timber Sale.** Approximately \$175,000 net revenue from a proposed County timber sale on Sodom Road will be used for general costs and contingency.

PROPERTY TAX. A 5% increase in the real property tax levy is proposed. This will produce an additional \$393,237 in revenue.

The County's Average Tax Rate will increase from \$5.80 per 1000 in 2001 to \$6.00 per 1000.

It is expected that a homeowner assessed at \$100,000 would pay approximately \$20.00 more a year as a result of this increase.

It should be noted that this represents the first increase in the Average County Tax Rate (ACTR) in eight (8) years.

There is little change in the allocation of the total budget to major budget centers, with the majority of spending allocated for

For the 11th year, the budget does not contain a subsidy to the Wyoming County Community Health System.

Looking at the budget plan from a closer perspective, it

- Does not support the creation of any new positions.
- Provides for no layoffs or reductions in workforce of regular, full-time employees at this time.
- Contains no capital equipment purchases, except sheriff vehicles

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and a modest amount for DSS and the Information Technology Departments (\$11,000).

- Provides for the continued support of all existing contract agencies at 2001 levels.
- Eliminates the Stream Maintenance Program and CAFO subsidy programs.
- Provides no funding for new programs or initiatives.
- Provides for sufficient funding to honor those labor contracts already in force at this time.
- Provides for increased funding for the assigned counsel program.
- Increases the amount available for County Snow from \$1.1M in 2001 to \$1,470,297 next year,

And, finally, and most importantly, the 2002 Budget provides sufficient funds to continue those County services either mandated or deemed a priority by the Board of Supervisors.

No budget can provide for each and every exigency that may occur. This is especially the case this year as uncertain national and state events have made the job of budgeting extremely difficult.

There are a number of unknown challenges on the horizon that could test the tenets of this thesis.

These include

- Sales Tax Revenue. Our sales tax revenues have grown more than 5% a year. This growth was used to pay the cost of various unfunded mandates passed on to the County by the State, and to finance some much needed improvements. Our sales tax revenue will not grow, but more likely decline.
- Medicaid. The cost of providing Medicaid coverage is expected to climb significantly with the coming on line of the Family Health Plus Program. Depending on the growth of this program, we may or may not have sufficient revenues to cover program expenses.

- Wyoming County Community Health System. The hospital again has not requested a subsidy from the County. However, their reimbursements are under continual assault from the federal and state governments, as well as from their insurance payers. If the hospital were to need a subsidy as it has in the distant past, the County's whole financial picture would be radically changed.

- Budgetary constraint and control. There is no room in this budget for additional appropriations.

If any one of these pressure points were to come to fruition, the County's only option to meet these challenges would be through personnel and service cutbacks.

The Board of Supervisors asks its employees, both union and management, as well as its department heads and contract agencies to do all they can to provide the best services at the lowest possible cost.

This is more than just a slogan; it is the key to the County's financial future during the coming year and in years to come.

We look forward to the challenges of 2002, and doing the work of the people that this budget makes possible.

Chairman Berwanger, T/Arcade, asked for any questions or comments at this time.

One constituent asked why the hospital takes 44% of our budget. It was explained to the constituent that the hospital budget by law has to be placed under our budget, however, there is no tax levy given to the hospital at all.

Another constituent asked why the County doesn't hold a Count Lottery like New York State Lotto. Supervisor Humphrey, Chairman of the Finance Committee, explained the gentleman that New York State Legislation does not provide for Counties to run their own lottery games. She will however consider it in Finance Committee and see if that was a possibility in the future.

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A constituent asked what County roads were scheduled to be reconstructed in 2002. It was explained to her by Supervisor Agan, Chairman of the Public Works Committee, that there were no roads scheduled to be reconstructed or built in 2002. Only minor repairs will be made to the roads due to the loss of funding by New York State. It was also explained that the County had lost \$200,000.00 in funding that was anticipated for this FY 2001.

It was asked why Wyoming County Transit received new and bigger buses. With all the monetary problems why was Wyoming County buying newer and bigger buses, when it seems that smaller vehicles or vans would probably do the job. Supervisor Humphrey, Chairman of the Finance Committee, explained that the County does not fund Wyoming County Transit System. This is supported by the Rochester Genesee Regional Transportation System and NYSDOT. The only money Wyoming County Transit System receives by the County is a one time contractual support payment of \$20,200.00.

Supervisor Herman, stated at this time that he is not in support of this budget at this time. Mr. Herman feels that we need to look at the budget as a two year budget not a one year budget, because of not knowing what will happen not only on a state level but also on a federal level. He also stated that this budget does not allow for any roads to be done in 2002 and feels that we can not let our roads deteriorate. Mr. Herman believes that there needs to be a higher tax increase, and that we should not be passing a budget knowing we will be amending it in the future.

One constituent asked why the Board of Elections has a increase in revenues from 2001 if there has been a budget cut. It was explained to him that the revenues coming in for 2002 is higher than that of 2001 , due to election cost in each town and village. Each Town and village is billed for their election costs based on the number of registered voters in that town and village, whether or not if they voted. Also primary expenses are charged to each town and village. With a higher amount of registered voters the higher the cost and vice versa.

It was also asked why the salary lines in the Board of Elections budget was cut. It was explained to him by Mrs. Humphrey, Chairman of the Finance Committee, that if this budget is passed as presented it will cut two full time positions to part time.

Supervisor Bush, T/Gainesville, addressed the Board with the following message:

I was going to vote no on the propsed budget but feel that it is in the best interest of the County to vote for it. There are a couple of things like the cut in and proposed changes in staffing at the Board of Elections and the

freezing of wages for DSI that I don't agree with and will continue to oppose during the year.

I think all 16 of us will agree that the budget isn't perfect but it is a tool that we can work with. A lot of time and hard work have gone into this by the budget team, the finance committee and our Department Heads. I think we also understand that the next couple of years are going to be tough years. With State cut backs we will need to all work hard to make this budget work

I feel that by not passing this budget we will end up looking like our State Representatives in Albany.

We have all been impacted greatly by the tragic events of September 11th and I feel that we all need to work together to get through this tough time in our Nation's History. Thank you.

Chairman Berwanger, T/Arcade, asked if there were any other comments or questions regarding the 2002 County Budget. Hearing no further comments Chairman Berwanger declared the public hearing closed.

Supervisor Herman, T/Wethersfield moved to adjourn the meeting at 2:07 PM.

Chairman Berwanger, T/Arcade, introduced Sheriff Ely. Sheriff Ely went on to introduce the Juvenile Officer, Kenneth Weaver. Officer Weaver informed the Board of Supervisors of his position and duties and the Juvenile Officer. Also what agencies he works with in this position along with the positive outcome of having a juvenile officer in the county.

Chairman Berwanger, T/Arcade, proposed to consolidate Resolution Office #'s Three (3) through Twenty Eight (28) for Consent Agenda. A voice vote was taken and the request was granted.

Public Defender, Norm Effman asked Chairman Berwanger if he could make a comment before continuing on with the meeting. Chairman Berwanger granted his request. Mr. Effman address the Board regarding the DATA Day Program with the following:

This is a personal plea to the members of the Wyoming County Board of Supervisors to reconsider a proposed budget cut which, perhaps unknowingly, completely eliminates Wyoming County's day reporting alternative to incarceration program.

In March of 1997, funds became available to Wyoming County to establish a defender-based advocacy program for an alternative to incarceration program. The basic focus of the program was to create community based services as an alternative to incarceration for individuals facing criminal charges in Wyoming County. The focus group is non-violent offenders with multiple needs, that is individuals with various problems, such as:

- Lack of Education
- Lack of Employment Skills
- Mental Health Problems
- Anger Management Problems
- Substance and Alcohol Abuse Problems.

With the cooperation and urging of the Probation Department and the District Attorney's Office, as well as our local Judges and Magistrates, a program was designed which would bring Wyoming County a "day reporting" program for individuals on probation or referred to the program directly from local courts. The program targeted individuals in 18 to 25 years of age group with multiple needs who could be treated in a community rather than a jail setting.

The program was thought of as a "last resort" for individuals to gain access to treatment who would otherwise be incarcerated. The specific target of this program would be individuals who are not in school and who are unemployed. The initial state grant was \$15,000.00 and required local matching funds.

The effort to coordinate local mental health, substance abuse and other providers took literally years to accomplish. Some of the difficulties which had to be overcome included the examination of the "site" to see if it conformed to various state requirements so that providers could offer their services at a central location managed by the Public Defenders's office rather than at their own sites. The thought was to conduct the program much like a high school, where those receiving services would have to report on a daily basis and attend various programs throughout the day. The individual's progress would be monitored by the providers and the coordinator of the program would transmit the information to the individual's probation officer and/or Judge.

State budget cuts over the last several years have reduced the state grant to \$11,800.00; thus, the county matching funds were also reduced to \$11,800.00.

Over the last several years the program has experienced a number of successes. Individuals without high school diplomas have received their GED. Young men and women who were entering the revolving door of the justice system because of alcohol or substance abuse have become productive members of the community and the cycle of violence has been avoided through the use of anger management programs benefitting the client, his or her family, and the community.

With little or no discussion with the criminal justice community, the proposed 2002 budget eliminates the \$11,800.00 matching funds from the county necessary to maintain the program. The impact to the Public Defender's Office is, of course, not \$11,800.00 but, with loss of state funds \$23,600.00. The economic reality is that the total cost of this program, under \$24,000.00, is recouped by diverting one individual from incarceration in Wyoming County

Jail for a period of nine months.

I can assure you that without this alternative to incarceration, more than one individual who would have benefitted from these programs will be incarceration rather than helped through supervision in the community.

This "Unkindest Cut Of All" eliminates a program that took years to develop, eliminates a program which provides an opportunity for positive changes in the lives of hundreds of local residents, and eliminates a program relied on by all members of the criminal justice community to stop the cycle of crime.

If one were to look at only the economic aspect of this "budget cut", it represents a poor choice, sacrificing long term gains for a short-sighted goal of applying a band-aid to our budget crisis. Not only will we be rejecting \$11,800.00 of state aid, but we will ultimately pay more from our tax levy in jail costs than the \$11,800.00 saved by this budget cut.

I urge you to restore the \$11,800.00 necessary for local matching funds to enable our day reporting program to continue. Thank you.

Chairman Berwanger thanked Mr. Effman and asked if there were any other comments in regards to Resolution Office #'s Three (3) through Twenty Eight (28). At that time Supervisor Rogers asked to make a comment in regards to Resolution Office # Eleven (11) pertaining to a contract with Mrs Grugel.

Supervisor Rogers, T/Pike stated that the last few months the Pathways Public Relation Committee has worked on getting a County resource guide of service agencies. All members of the Board were given a draft of the resource guide to be placed in the Wyoming County Chamber of Commerce business directory. There will be 28 pages dedicated to the resource guide including a cover page, summary page and index. Also a cross reference guide to direct to people as to were to go or call. This is funded by a state grant.

Supervisor Agan, T/Attica, spoke on behlaf of Supervisor West, T/Organgeveille at the request of Supervisor West, regarding Resolution Office # 15. This is a matching grant renewable for five years at a total amount of \$250,000.00 or \$50,000.00 a year in collaboration with Mental Health and Probation. This grant is to assist Juvenile Delinquents. Supervisor Agan stated if there were any questions regarding the grant he would be happy to answer them. There were no questions asked.

Chairman Berwanger, asked if there was any further business to come before the Board. At this time Supervisor Rogers requested to address his fellow Board members, Department Heads and all that were present. Supervisor Rogers, Chairman of the Health and Human Services Committee, went on to address an article that was written in the Daily News out of Batavia, NY that gave Wyoming County a failing grade of "F" in relations to the use of the tobacco money that the County receives from a judgement of a lawsuit. Several groups such as Red Cross, Cancer Society, etc... graded the county with an failing grade because the county has not given any money for these agencies from the Tobacco Settlement

Supervisor Rogers went on to state that the money received from the tobacco lawsuit has to be used for Capital Improvements and Debt Reduction according to the terms of the settlement. Currently there are several county departments and county agencies running programs and working on passing some kind of smoking legislation for Wyoming County. Just recently a county

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wide Smoke Legislation Sub-Committee was formed to look at possibly creating some kind of proposal or smoke legislation to be passed by this Board. At this time Supervisor Rogers could not present any kind of monetary figure that these department or agencies are spending on smoke free programs, but there are programs in place and will continue to run those programs while continuing to reach their goals. Supervisor Rogers then thanked the Chairman for the opportunity to address the article that was written in the Daily News.

Chairman Berwanger continued on with the news that it was a bitter sweet day for Wyoming County. Supervisor from the town of Middlebury, Arnold Cox, marks his final meeting with the full board. Mr. Cox has served for many years from 1990 til 2002, twelve years. He has served on many committees, such as, Fire and Civil Defense, Planning , Human Services, Audit, Highway, Insurance, Public Health, Public Works, Public Safety, Courthouse and Agriculture Committee. This past year as Chairman of the Agriculture Committee he managed to realize and obtain a new Animal Shelter for Wyoming County. Chairman Berwanger continued saying, "As a supervisor I would like to say, that through his vision, dedication, loyalty and commitment to the residents of Wyoming County".
