

Dwyer Newsletter May 2025

The 22nd of May will be the 78th anniversary of Congress' adoption of the Truman Doctrine. While Nazi Germany and Soviet Russia were naturally ideological enemies and the Molotov-Ribbentrop Pact (The Non-Aggression Pact) was an alliance of convenience between the two countries (especially from Germany's point of view), Operation Barbarossa thrust the Russians to the Allied side for the duration of World War II. Aligning with the Soviet Union was a necessary evil to defeat the common enemy of Germany. With the conclusion of the war and Joseph Stalin unsurprisingly backtracking on his promises of allowing the people of Eastern Europe the rights of self-determination and pulling them into the Soviet sphere of influence, Winston Churchill gave his famous speech on 5 March 1946 at Westminster College in Fulton, Missouri. Here, he uttered the famous words, "From Stettin in the Baltic, to Trieste in the Adriatic, an iron curtain has descended across the continent." This speech brought the term "iron curtain" into the vernacular of the free world and opened more people's eyes to what was going on in Eastern Europe.

By 1947, the communists in Greece were closing in on a victory in their Civil War and Turkey was being pressured by the Soviet Union to allow shipping to flow freely through the Turkish straits. Britain would traditionally help in these cases but by 1947, their economy was in a bad spot and they just did not have the resources to help Greece to remain free of communist rule or to do a show of force in Turkish waters. On 12 March, 1947, President Truman gave a speech to a joint session of Congress detailing the situation in Europe and asking congress to assist Greece and Turkey. After negotiating with the Republican controlled Congress, most members of Congress voted on May 22nd to approve the use of \$400 million in military and economic aid to Greece and Turkey, with 75% of that for Greece. This did the trick as by 1948, the Greek civil war was over with a defeat for the communists and Turkey successfully resisted the Soviet demands and the U.S. Navy sent the USS FDR to Turkey as a show of force.

The Truman Doctrine also steered the country to a policy of containment and the creation of the 'domino effect theory' where it was believed that if one country fell to communism, then it would spread to her neighboring country and so on. This led to the creation of NATO in 1949 as a way to contain communism on the European continent to where it was at that time; it worked as no Western European countries ever fell. The doctrine, however, also led to the deaths of at least 94,794 Americans.

The Korean War commenced via an invasion by North Korea on 25 June, 1950. Although the south had twice as many people, their military was ill prepared and just two days later, Seoul fell. The U.S. did not desire to intervene because they were more concerned with protecting Europe and Korea was but a small country. However, between the UN voting to support the south and President Truman deciding to act, we did. Truman gave a speech that summer outlining how allowing the south to be absorbed by the north would follow the policy of appeasement that led to World War II while also mentioning that it would embolden communist leaders worldwide to act and thus the domino effect would occur. When President Kennedy took over for President Eisenhower, he desired to continue the Truman Doctrine just as his predecessor did. By the fall of 1961, Kennedy saw the domino effect in play via the failed Bay of Pigs Invasion, the negotiations with Laos between the pro-Western side and the communists, the construction of the Berlin Wall and the Cuban Missile Crisis. He was determined to "draw a line in the sand" at Vietnam and prevent a communist victory and further harm U.S. credibility. Thus, the long U.S. intervention in Vietnam began.

Ultimately, we won the Cold War and the domino effect never occurred for a plethora of reasons. In 1989, there were 61 communist countries, now there are Five.
